**HRH Princess Dana Firas of Jordan** is President of the Petra National Trust and President of ICOMOS Jordan. Since 2017 she has been a UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador in recognition of her commitment to heritage protection and preservation as pillars for sustainable development, and her contribution to responsible tourism and community participation.



**Dan Snow** is a British Canadian BAFTA-winning history broadcaster and best-selling writer. His TV shows for the BBC, Discovery and History Channel have been watched all over the world. He founded History Hit, a digital history broadcaster which has a global audience of millions. He was part of the successful expedition to find Shackleton's ship, the Endurance, in 2022.



**Sneška Quaedvlieg-Mihailovic**, Secretary General of Europa Nostra, has dedicated her life to championing Europe's shared values and cultural heritage. She has worked for Europa Nostra for over 30 years, and was appointed as the organisation's Secretary General in 2000. Sneška played a prominent role in advocating for and implementing the European Year of Cultural Heritage 2018 and is now a member of the EC Expert Group on Cultural Heritage.











# Cultural performance - Tuesday 3 December Talal Abu Al Ragheb

Talal Abu Al Ragheb is a Jordanian music and film composer, sound designer and music producer. He is one of Jordan's most prominent composers, with over 25 years of experience in music. He has produced musical pieces locally and internationally for various TV and radio commercials, theatre productions, documentaries, films, children's songs and concerts. His albums include Rou'ya (2007), Al Hadi (2011), and Euphoria (2017). Talal has received the order of Al Istiqlal of the third degree from His Majesty King Abdullah II on the occasion of the 73rd independence Day 2019, and holds the Queen Rania award for Creativity, as well as multiple local and international accolades in recognition of his talent and passion for music.

## **Presentations and panels - Tuesday 3 December**

Presentation: Lessons from Withstanding Change: heritage amongst climate uncertainty - Dave Simpson and Emily Drani

Since 2022 and supported by the British Council's Cultural Protection Fund, INTO has been working with six of its member organisations to improve the resilience of heritage sites affected by climate change in Jordan, Egypt, Ethiopia, Uganda, Zanzibar (Tanzania) and the UK. In so doing, the programme has sought to sensitise both the heritage sector and wider public to the important relationship between climate change and heritage.

In this session, Programme Manager Dave Simpson will introduce the methodology employed to run this multi-country, multi-year initiative, and showcase some of the incredible stories that have unfolded. Emily Drani will speak to some of the challenges and opportunities that arose from the perspective of Cultheme, who were contracted to undertake an independent evaluation of programme outcomes.

Panel: Lessons for a future climate: the culture-climate dynamic in the context of heritage - John de Coninck, May al-Ibrashy, Shatha Safi, Rashad Salim. Moderator: Imogen Wood

Following the Withstanding Change presentation, the panel will present their experiences of heritage conservation in the face of other challenges, compounded by climate change. The session will consider how to balance short-term pressures alongside long-term climate risk, and how to navigate conservation leadership at a strategic and grass-roots level in the face of these challenges. Community engagement and lessons from recent project experiences provide diverse examples on this difficult work.

# Lessons from Withstanding Change: climate change communications and education

This session will be a deep-dive into ways of targeting key stakeholders to raise awareness of climate change and its impact on heritage. Discussion will touch on a range of innovative educational initiatives aimed particularly at young people, and will bring together best practice from Uganda, the United Kingdom and Jordan.

### **Resilient Heritage Trinidad and Tobago**

Climate change is threatening vulnerable historic coastal communities and heritage sites across the Caribbean region, including Trinidad and Tobago. The National Trust of Trinidad and Tobago has collaborated with the University of Florida Historic Preservation Program (UFHPP) to conduct *Resilient Heritage Trinidad and Tobago* – a two-phase initiative to advance the resilience and long-term preservation of the nation's historic places and cultural resources as they are impacted by climate change.

Heritage pilot sites were digitally documented and coastal threats were modelled with a focus on flooding. One of the goals of the project was to engage a wide range of stakeholders in the process and identify shared values to inform the recommendations. This presentation will discuss the methods used, insights and outcomes from the project and encourage a dialogue of using cultural heritage as a lens with which we can engage people in the fight against climate change.

## Inspiring change: cultivating leadership for a transforming world

This session highlights young people's leading role in turning challenges into opportunities, and driving meaningful change in their communities. Discover practical insights into leadership frameworks that empower collaboration and resilience, inspiring action with focus on heritage in an ever-evolving world.

### Lessons from Withstanding Change: adapting assets and places

Drawing on experiences from the Withstanding Change project and their wider work, speakers will provoke thought and discussion around compounding heritage threats; considering the risks of both climate change and development pressures. How can governments and conservation professionals consider and plan for both short term and long term change, particularly in the face of the short term threats being so evident and present?

# The role of heritage projects in the aftermath of conflict: volunteer-led rehabilitation of Georgia's Tsiskarauli Tower

This session explores how volunteer heritage restoration projects can play a crucial role in post-conflict reconstruction and reconciliation. We will use a case study from Georgia to look at a project which addressed not only the preservation of tangible heritage, but also social healing within communities. Hear from the project team and discuss if this could work for you.

# Heritage leadership: sustaining Petra through resilience and innovation

PDTRA exemplifies adaptive heritage management in the face of regional challenges. This session explores the initiatives to build local resilience and balance preservation with sustainable tourism in Petra, offering insights into navigating complexities at a world heritage site while fostering community empowerment and innovation.

### **Lessons from Withstanding Change: policy and advocacy**

This session will hear from experts based in Egypt and Zanzibar about the policy and advocacy work they have undertaken as part of the Withstanding Change project and elsewhere. It will delve into the challenges they have experienced in working with government on issues affecting heritage sites, the opportunities they have been able to capitalise on, and key learnings.

### Living heritage at risk

Many heritage protection actions, particularly in crisis situations, focus on the physical infrastructure that has been destroyed, but the preservation of living cultural heritage is equally pivotal to re-building societies and ensuring communities are able to reconnect and to thrive. 'Living Heritage' is our languages, music, food, artisan crafts, customs, knowledge, practices and values that are transmitted from generation to generation. Is enough being done to protect and nurture living heritage? Is it useful to separate it from built and other physical heritage, or from our natural heritage such as landscapes, geological features and wildlife?

This session will feature provocations from those working in living heritage, leading to a group discussion about how we best identify, categorise and protect the living heritage that is vital to the survival of communities.

### Heritage in challenging environments: Jordan's adaptive strategies

This session delves into Jordan's innovative approaches to heritage preservation amid environmental and socio-economic challenges. Our distinguished speakers will share their expertise on integrating climate resilience, community engagement, and sustainable development into heritage management.



# Presentation: **Youth engagement in heritage programmes**Sofya Shahab and Ayoob Thanoon

Young people are key custodians and agents of heritage, as it is the values that have the most meaning and relevance to them that will be used to shape future heritages. Yet, approaches to, and understandings of, heritage and its preservation have predominantly focused on elders and elites. Drawing on the wealth of experience of INTO and the CPF network, this interactive workshop will discuss and test ideas for supporting youth engagements with heritage with the aim of sharing knowledge and best practice amongst the group.

# Presentation/workshop: **Heritage and the power of imagination**Shaherazad Umbreen, Director - Marketing, National Trust

History, Heritage, Nature and even Beauty can be polarising topics – especially in current times of widening social, political and economic divides. How can leaders in the heritage sector create the conditions for people to feel included in the spaces we collectively look after? Can wellbeing and belonging only be experienced through conditions which are engineered to create satisfaction and enjoyment, or is there more to it than that? In this session, Shaherazad shares an approach taken by the National Trust in England, Wales and Northern Ireland to enable growth in its inclusion and wellbeing potential. # Presentation: Port Royal and inclusiveness: community engagement alongside a quest for World Heritage inscription

Evelyn will explore the geography and sociology of the space, its formation from silt deposit from a river, at the tip of a peninsula, exposure to hurricane, etc. This limited growth of the land-bound space, their impact on the protective nature of the citizens and the spin-off effects on heritage development begs the community involvement in the decision making process. The survey of the citizens and their mood will be explored in the concept of inclusiveness and the context of Facing Change.

# Closing presentation: Rising from under the rubble: reviving the Orthodox theatre in Homs

Lama Abboud, Director, Turathuna

Since 2022, Lama and her team at Turathuna have been working to restore the oldest theatre in Homs (and the second-oldest theatre in Syria). On the frontline of the country's civil war for three years, Homs suffered immense damage to both its infrastructure and its cultural fabric, with the gaping hole left by a missile in the roof of the theatre – once a hub of community activity and cohesion – a potent symbol of this. Lama will take us through her approach to restoring the building and to rebuilding the local community's connection with their cultural heritage, instilling a new sense of hope for the future.

# Inclusive heritage: preserving Jordan's natural heritage in a changing climate

This session highlights efforts to preserve Jordan's natural heritage and biodiversity in the face of climate change. Dr. Nashat Humidan, a leading expert on Jordan's biodiversity, will share strategies for safeguarding natural heritage while fostering inclusivity and public engagement. Through innovative approaches that integrate conservation with accessibility, the session will explore how organizations are making Jordan's rich ecological and cultural landscapes resilient against climate change and relevant for all.

#### Stone masons

Skilled stonemasons, trained by the World Monuments Fund with support from the Cultural Protection Fund, will demonstrate traditional stone carving techniques. This session provides insight into the tools, products, and materials they use, showcasing the artistry behind each piece. Attendees will have the chance to try out some simple stone masonry techniques and see small stone samples up close, gaining hands-on experience nd a deeper appreciation for this cultural heritage craft.

# **Empowering the Grenada National Trust to advance heritage** preservation efforts in Grenada

In this workshop, Dr Ezra Matthias will lead a session focused on advancing heritage preservation efforts in Grenada, specifically through securing custodial authority over key heritage sites and modernizing governance frameworks.

Participants will collaborate to identify actionable steps to overcome institutional and legislative challenges while exploring how to elevate heritage preservation within national priorities. Join us to help shape a forward-looking action plan that bridges heritage conservation and community engagement, strengthening Grenada's cultural identity and sustainable economic growth.

# Culturally significant sites & peacebuilding in places reeling after conflict

This session explores the use of culturally significant sites as peacebuilding opportunities in post-conflict environments. Frazer provides valuable insights into the stabilisation and recovery of Iraq by improving resilience and promoting cohesion through projects involving cultural heritage and working with everyday places imbued with memories of violence.

Frazer has seen first-hand the impact of war and the ways the built environment has been used whether it's as tools for violence and control, sites to promote resilience and change, methods of memorialisation and healing or as a catalyst for peace. Frazer shares the successes and the failures of engaging the built environment as a peacebuilding ally.

### The future of digital cultural heritage

The British Council presents an in-depth analysis of the current state and future prospects of Digital Cultural Heritage. Through qualitative research with heritage specialists, technologists, activists and artists, it examines the technological, social, and environmental dynamics shaping Digital Cultural Heritage. Join us for a presentation on the report and a discussion about the opportunities and challenges in using digital tools in your own work.

Described by UNESCO as 'The Place of Tolerance and Urban Hospitality', As-Salt, an hour northwest of Amman, is an exceptional example of living heritage and of a historic urban landscape. **NB We recommend flat walking footwear and warm clothing for this visit.** 

### **Bayt Al Jaghbeer**

Situated in As-Salt, Jaghbeer House is a historic family residence characteristic of the area's traditional architecture. As part of the *Withstanding Change* project, Petra National Trust have restored this historic building and re-green parts of the surrounding landscape to combat the impact of climate change and support local livelihoods.
